Come, Doly Spirit!

During the Easter Season we've read, in place of lessons from the Hebrew Scriptures, stories of the explosion in growth of the Church in the early weeks and months after Jesus' Ascension. The Holy Spirit is given the credit and is present in many of the



stories. It's clear that preaching and healing alone could not inspire the Church's growth. The Holy Spirit, God's own presence, would be the soul of the Church. On the Day of Pentecost we celebrate the coming of God's Spirit to empower the Church and speed its growth.

One of the very first accounts in the Acts of the Apostles is of the Day of Pentecost, fifty days after Passover in the year of Jesus' death and Resurrection, in the century that would be the beginning of the Christian calendar. Jews had observed the Feast of Weeks, or Pentecost (in Greek, the fiftieth day) for centuries to celebrate the giving of the Law on Mt. Sinai. The Exodus from Egypt and the Law we know as the Ten Commandments are the foundation of Israel as a people. So Passover and Pentecost are foundational in their observances. Jews celebrate Pentecost today as Shavuot (weeks). The observance is mandated in the Torah to follow immediately the seven-week Counting of Omer, which begins on the second day of Passover. It is the completion of the seven-week counting period between Passover, when Yahweh freed Israel from slavery in Egypt, and the giving of the Law, which bound Israel to Yahweh as Yahweh's people committed to serving their God.

And so, on that day, fifty days after the Passover and (on our calendar) ten days after Jesus' Ascension, Jews from many countries gathered in Jerusalem to observe the feast of the giving of the Law. Jesus' followers gathered there as



faithful Jews. They were also waiting for the Holy Spirit to come (according to Luke's account), as Jesus had instructed them to do, and they had no idea when she would arrive or what her arrival would be like. I imagine the coming of the Spirit was even more dramatic and disruptive than we infer as we read Luke's account. Fire and wind, speaking in tongues other than their native ones, power and courage that are hard for us to imagine.

Have you ever experienced the Holy Spirit coming into your life? For most of us her coming is not as dramatic as it was that day in Jerusalem. And yet, God's promise is given to each of us. We receive the Holy Spirit when we are baptized. Her power is given to us, never to be taken away, to be our inspiration and courage whenever we speak and act in God's name. It's overwhelming, when we think about it.

And if we don't understand the Spirit as deserving our highest respect, we misunderstand. This is God. Very God of Very God, just as Jesus is. God with us and in us, to guide, to counsel, comfort, empower us. Do we feel her? Do we rely on her? Do we trust her?

Many churches play down the Holy Spirit, and I think it's because we realize that in her power we are called to let go of the control we hold on to so strongly. We are called to trust without knowing what, exactly, will happen. We are called to imagine what we can do and be when we trust the power of the Spirit. How might our Church explode with God's work in the world if we were to trust more in the power of the Spirit? God's promises are only for good. Why is it so hard to trust the power of the Spirit?

(Isaiah 6:1-8) Prophets are often called to speak the word of the Lord to those who have forgotten the distinction between holy and human. Yet it is this realization that opens Isaiah to the possibility of forgiveness. He is touched by divine intervention and made clean. Isaiah is now free to answer when God calls.

Would you like to make a huge difference in the lives of our seniors?

Meals on Wheels has openings for people to deliver nutritious meals to seniors who are home bound. The need is so great, and the difference we can make is just as great! Meals providing 1/3 of recommended dietary allowances are taken once each week to people who qualify, and the recipients are grouped by neighborhood or area of town for easy delivery. Deliveries are made between 9:00 am and noon, taking a total of about an hour. Two routes are open:

Twice/month on Thursdays, with 8 stops in the neighborhood of North Market and
Once/week on Monday or Tuesday

All meals are picked up at the Council on Aging office in Buckner Square. Training is provided for volunteers. As important as the meal delivery is the service of a safety check. If a recipient does not answer the door, the volunteer calls 911, and the police department will send someone to check on the home. This is all so critical in the lives of our seniors, especially those who live alone.

Holy Cross has received two grants from our Diocese!

The Diocese of Western Louisiana is creative in aiding churches who want to grow in their ministry. Up to \$5000 is available for capital improvements, and up to \$7500 for ministry initiatives. We applied for both grants this spring and were awarded the full amount for both!

A gift from the Wheless Foundation provides most of the funds for two new showers and toilets at Hope House, and the grant from the diocese rounds it out. Work is underway. Soon our neighbors will have three showers and toilets, arranged for optimum use with no wasted space! We are very grateful to the Wheless family and to our diocese!

You may know that Chuck Ellis has been working for about a year for St. Luke's and Holy Cross. He has an office at Hope House, and he is able to help people with medical needs, getting Medicaid and medicines, making doctors appointments and keeping them, applying for food stamps, etc. He has been at Hope House five hours a week; now he can be there ten hours a week to help our neighbors. Half of the Ministry Initiatives grant, along with funds from the Wheless Foundation, will make this possible.

Sally Fox will be at Hope House and in our neighborhood one day each week. Her ministry is open ended at this point, depending on the needs she discovers. For a start, she will be there to listen, serve Communion and offer bible study. She will also talk with the managers at the McAdoo and Fairmont to see if our church might offer something to their residents. One item up for discussion is Vacation Bible School for our neighbors, but we know the list of possibilities is almost endless. Half of the Ministry Initiatives grant and the Wheless Foundation are providing these funds for ministry in our neighborhood.
