## God's Faithfulness

Abraham is full of questions for God: How can I have descendants when you've given me no offspring? How do I know I'll possess the land you're promising me? How can I know your promises are true? That you'll keep them?



We have to say, these are reasonable questions. God had called Abram out of

his homeland to wander with his wife, servants, and livestock, but about all Abram had to hold on to were the call and the promises. Nothing tangible. Nothing that could be proved beyond a doubt.



And then, there's God's opening statement: Do not be afraid, Abram. I am your shield; your reward will be very great. So some fear must have mixed with Abram's doubt. A powerful force. A force that fights against faith.

We don't have to search deep to find our identity with Abram. In our obligations, our possessions, our

livelihood, we seek and need security. Money in the bank, the surety of a paycheck, the assurance that our house will not fall down around our heads, the means to pay our bills and feed others who depend on us. A contract. A legal document. Insurance. Something more than a verbal covenant.

But when we get right down to it, there are many assurances that won't hold up. Disaster may come, sickness, a devastating accident, paralyzing grief, national or international financial crisis. Our best-laid plans and securities can be spoiled, and we can find that our carefully protected resources are gone. Abram didn't have all the "things" we have today, but he had the same fears, and they may have been more prominent in his consciousness than they are in ours, as he lived day to day, close to the earth.

And so God made a covenant with Abram, in the way binding promises were made 4,000 years ago. God would keep God's word. Abraham could depend on it.

The story goes that this covenant was made about the land God would provide for Abraham's children, the land of Canaan, Israel—the land that is treasured today by Abraham's descendants: Jews, Christians, and Muslims. But as the descendants of Abraham and Isaac, and Jacob, whose name God changed to Israel, found as they journeyed with God and came to know more fully the God who had called them on this journey, the promise was really not for a tangible commodity: not land, not descendants, not prosperity. No, the covenant was for something much more valuable, something everlasting. God's promise is to be with us, to stay with us, forever. Through thick and thin, through disaster and prosperity, through sickness and health. Even through our failure to be faithful in our trust and journey with God.

Abram could not know the end of the story; his call was to believe the promise, and we can believe that would be hard, seeing that the God making the promise had been known to him only for a short time and so far had disrupted his life completely. Abram could not know that God's own Son would endure suffering and death as horrible as human beings can inflict on one another, and that through it all God would remain faithful to God's people, just as God promised. Surely, Abram did find peace and trust in God's presence, the fulfilment of another promise God made, whose implications he may not have dreamed: you will be my people, and I will be your God. Forever.

And so as we twenty-first-century followers of Jesus journey through Lent, God calls us into a deeper faith: Do not be afraid, even though doubt and fear linger in the shadows. The end of the story, Jesus' Resurrection, is the assurance of God's everlasting faithfulness. God is with us in all that can come to us in this life. God is with us as we walk with one another and seek to be God's love and faithfulness to one another. We can say with the psalmist: The LORD is my light and my salvation; whom then shall I fear? \* The LORD is the strength of my life; of whom then shall I be afraid? (Psalm 27)

## The Third Sunday in Lent February 28, 2016


(Psalm 63:1-8) The psalmist needs immediate help and protection. The psalm juxtaposes his physical need for water with his spiritual thirst for God. Surprisingly, the latter dominates! Although his body wastes from dehydration, his spiritual longing for God takes precedence. Hunted and afraid for his life, the psalmist remembers God's protection and loving kindness. The psalmist recalls seeing God's power and glory in the sanctuary (v. 2). His soul longs for God. The psalm presents the ideas that longing is healthy, that thirsting for God's presence invites and brings God's presence, and that God's presence satisfies longings. In addition, God's presence, because of God's nature, always brings more blessings than a supplicant seeks.
